

Daniela Sandler is associate professor of architectural and urban history at the University at Buffalo. She holds a PhD in Visual and Cultural Studies (University of Rochester) and a professional degree in Architecture and Urbanism (University of São Paulo). Her work examines urban inequalities, spotlighting how groups and individuals fight for more inclusive cities through the intersection of bottom-up tactics and official policies. In *Counterpreservation: Architectural Decay in Berlin since 1989* (Cornell University Press, 2016), she investigates how Berlin residents appropriated architectural decay to engage a difficult past, resist gentrification, and create alternative housing and cultural spaces. The book received the Antoinette Forrester-Downing Award (Society of Architectural Historians, 2019). Her current book in progress is the first city-wide study of grassroots urbanism and inclusive city-making in São Paulo. Her teaching takes a global approach to topics such as colonialism, gender, race, health, preservation, memory, and food.

Daniela is associate dean for inclusive excellence at the School of Architecture and Planning at UB, a position she took in Fall 2022. Her experience in equity, diversity, social justice, and inclusion includes her previous job at the University of Minnesota, where she advised the Women in Architecture Student Organization and was a co-founding member of the School of Architecture Diversity Committee and the Racial and Spatial Justice Working Group.
