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Research interests: Architecture and urbanism in the United States

Professor Gutman, historian and licensed architect, teaches architectural and urban history at the Bernard and Anne Spitzer School of Architecture at the City College of New York and The Graduate Center of the City University of New York. She examines ordinary buildings and neighborhoods, the history of cities, and issues of gender, class, race, and especially childhood as they play out in everyday spaces, public culture, and social life. She is the author of *A City for Children: Women, Architecture, and the Charitable Landscapes of Oakland, 1850–1950* (University of Chicago Press, 2014), winner of the SAH Kostof prize in 2017, and the UHA Jackson prize in 2015. Her current book project is *Just Space: Modern Architecture, Public Schools, and Racial Inequality in Postwar Urban America* (in contract, University of Texas Press). Prof. Gutman is a founding editor of [PLATFORM](#), the online forum for conversations about buildings, spaces, and landscapes, and the president-elect of the Society for American City and Regional Planning History. In August 2021, Professor Gutman was appointed Interim Dean of the Spitzer School of Architecture at the City College of New York.

Professor Gutman received the 2021 Catherine W. Bishir Prize, from the Vernacular Architecture Forum for “Intermediate School 201: Race, Space, and Modern Architecture in Harlem,” chapter 8 in *Educating Harlem: A Century of Schooling and Resistance in a Black Community*, ed. Ansley Erickson and Ernest Morrell (Columbia University Press, 2019). Professor Gutman was a Distinguished CUNY Research Fellow at the Graduate Center’s Advanced Research Collaborative in 2018. Her research has also been supported by the National Endowment for the Humanities, the New York State Council on the Arts, the Danish Humanities Council and other organizations.
